

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

The COVID-19 pandemic

has placed a pause on in-person collaboration. Along with the rest of the theatre community, I'm grieving and mourning the loss of theatre. Yet, I sit and write this Director's note after a day of in-person, masked and socially-distant collaboration on Tomas and The Library Lady. As a team we've experimented with a process that is much different than what we're used to in the before times. Every single member of the team has filled this experiment with gratitude, trust, and an immense amount of care. That thoughtfulness has allowed us to inhabit the theatre together and even 5 at a time, I promise you the magic is alive, it's breathing and ready to erupt once again. "On behalf of the many Chicano parents who have aspired for generations that their children be educated but who do not know what the education system is..." That is the line that ultimately led me to direct Tomás & The Library Lady. I see my ancestors in this play, out in fields working tirelessly, dreaming of a better future. I am the descendant of Mexican immigrants. I am a first generation college student. I am the only male in my extended family who does not work outside in the scorching sun with his hands. I am the first person in my extended family to pursue a graduate degree. All of these firsts have been made possible because of the people who have come before me, including the great Tomás Rivera. As an artist, I feel it is a privilege and a necessity to tell stories that matter, to tell stories that teach you something about yourself and the world you want to live in. This story has allowed me to graze shoulders with my ancestors and acknowledge what they did for me to be here. Here, now, creating a beautiful community and taking on the joyous task of telling this story. It isn't often that I feel I am honoring my ancestors with the stories I tell. Tomás & The Library Lady is different, it is one of the incredibly rare moments where I am able to pay tribute to those who have paved the way and dreamt for a better future. I hope this play honors Tomás Rivera and inspires children to face their fears with imagination, creativity, and resilience.
