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DIRECTOR'S NOTE

The term Intersectionality wasn't coined until 1989 by Kimberlé Crenshaw. Wine in the Wilderness was written in 1969, twenty years beforehand, and yet Alice Childress's play was already talking about this idea of the overlap between our oppressed or privileged identities that shape the person we are and how the world interacts with us. Childress expertly uses discussions of race, sex, and class to show how all of these factors contribute to the oppression of Black women. Bill Jameson, a male artist, hopes to capture the essence of Black womanhood in his latest triptych. His first image depicts a little girl: the representation of childhood innocence. In the second painting, there is Wine in the Wilderness, an impossibly beautiful African Queen and the epitome of what the Black woman should strive to be. Bill's third canvas is blank as he searches for the perfect model to represent "the messed up chick" that society has created. She is coarse, vulgar, ignorant, and the opposite of everything Wine in the Wilderness represents. In comes Tommy, who destroys all of Bill's pre-perceived notions on blackness, womanhood, and who in our community is deserving of dignity. This play becomes a real conversation amonast the Black community about the vast identities that it holds and our perceptions of each other. With this play, I'm interested in having a dialogue about what is blackness, what are our unique perspectives on blackness, where do we overlap, where is there room for all of us to learn from each other's perspectives, and how do we give each other a little more dignity as the days pass by.

DAVID AREVALO (Costume Designer). David is thrilled to be collaborating on this first ever Visions and Voices Black Playwrights' Reading Series. Recent NU credits include Costume Designer for Eurydice and Machinal. Outside of NU credits include Assistant Costume Designer for Hartford Stage's production of *Quixote Nuevo*, Costume Designer for Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park (*Pinocchio, Rapunzel*) in 2018, and Associate Costume Designer for Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra's 2017 production of *Pelleas Et Melisande*. He is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin and a 3rd year MFA candidate in Costume Design at Northwestern.

Jazzlyn has created for the Hollywood Fringe Festival, is an Associate Artist at Third Culture Theatre Company and a company member of Antaeus Theatre. She holds a BA in Theatre from University of Illinois—Chicago.

ELLIOT MARVIN SIMS (Bill) Elliot, is excited to be working on his first production with Northwestern as a first year MFA Acting student. Born and raised in Dallas, Texas where his love for the stage originated as early as ten years old, he would later gain a rare acceptance by his Junior year to attend and graduate from the prestigious school that churned the likes of Erykah Badu and Nora Jones at; Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing and Visual Arts. However, not stopping his educational pursuits there, Elliot attended The University of North Texas where he received his Bachelors of Arts in Theatre/Performance and played a vast array of memorable roles in shows such as; *Fabulation or the Re-education of Undine, The Merry Wives of Windsor, and The Philadel-phia Story*. Elliot's most acclaimed performance was the lead character in a World Premiere Play written by Regina Taylor called, *BREAD*, at the Water Tower Theatre in Dallas, Texas. This work garnered Elliot's first theatre award; an 2018 Irma P. Hall Black Theater Award for Best Leading Actor in a Play.

KEVIN AOUSSOU (Sonny-man) is a first year Acting MFA. An alumnus of Winthrop University and the National Theater Institutes Moscow Art Theatre Semester. From Charlotte, NC he's performed with Children's Theatre of Charlotte, Actors Theatre of Charlotte, and Shakespeare Carolina. Past credits include Hedgerow Theater's *Moby Dick*, and *Game of Love and Chance*, Theater at Monmouth's productions of *Measure for Measure*, *Twelfth Night*, and *Sense and Sensibility*. STAN BROWN (Oldtimer) is the Inaugural W. Rockwell Wirtz Professor and Director of Graduate Studies of the MFA in Acting program at the School of Communication. Stan earned his MFA in Acting from the University of South Carolina in 1989. While there, Stan was named a graduate acting fellow at the Shakespeare Theatre in Washington D.C., where he received the core of his classical actor training. Stan began his work in university teaching at the University of Warwick in Coventry, England, where he taught acting and was a postgraduate researcher in Contemporary Shakespearean Performance (exploring director Peter Brook's body of work with the Royal Shakespeare Company). In the U.K., Stan was invited to work with the voice department at the RSC by Cicely Berry, RSC Director of Voice and the author of internationally renowned books Voice and the Actor, The Actor and His Text, and Text in Action. This training and experience initiated Stan's ongoing explorations into perceptions and impacts of 'culture' on voice and speech training for the actor. He maintained an active professional relationship with the RSC's voice department and, specifically, Ms. Berry and her work until her retirement and passing in 2018. Apart from his work as a teacher, voice/dialect coach, and director, Stan has worked as a professional actor for over 30 years in American and British theatre, film, television and radio. Some of his credits include featured roles on NBC's Homicide: Life in the Streets and recurring roles on In the Heat of the Night and the critically acclaimed I'll Fly Away. In film, Stan co-starred in Robby Benson's Modern Love and the cult film Getting In opposite Calista Flockhart, Matthew Perry, Dave Chapelle, and Christine Baranski. The film was the directorial debut of Doug Liman, who would later direct Swingers, Bourne Identity, and Mr. & Mrs. Smith. In 2015 Stan played the lead in the short film The Bespoke Tailoring of Mr. Bellamy. The film won the prestigious Louisiana Film Prize—the largest monetary prize in the world for short film—and was shortlisted for the Academy Award ballot. Stan also won the Louisiana Film Prize Best Actor award for his work.

ISMAEL LARA, JR. (Associate Producer) is a Latine director, educator, organizer, and producer from Southeast Texas and is currently an MFA Directing candidate at Northwestern. He is focused on championing work that aids the fight against injustice, creating a bridge between underrepresented communities and the theatrical institution. Ismael is a recipient of the 2019 Hangar Drama League Fellowship.

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
