DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Welcome to the theatre! On behalf of the hundreds of us who have worked on this production actors, musicians, designers, technicians, crew members, faculty, staff, and especially students we are thrilled to welcome you to this story about young Jane Goodall. We know that she became an adult whose research changed the way we view the relationship between animals and humans forever. She grew up to be a protector of animals and their habitats, as well as an advocate for the power of young people to make a difference. These facts invite us to wonder about her childhood, and fortunately for all of us, Dame Jane Goodall has been generous with her stories. Patrick McDonnell, a marvelous author and illustrator, has chronicled her childhood in the delightful picture book Me...Jane. Playwright Aaron Posner (a Northwestern Alum), along with composer-lyricist Andy Mitton, has adapted the book for the stage, which recently had its world premiere at the Kennedy Center. We were drawn to this story of a plucky young girl being raised by a single mother in an ordinary backyard immediately. Jane Goodall is adamant that in addition to her mother, the animals in her life (chickens, squirrels, and a very special dog) were her best teachers. She took the lessons she learned from the animals all the way to Africa, and was one of the first people ever to receive a PhD without having ever attained an undergraduate degree (it was a money thing). Some of those lessons, such as compassion for others, resilience, and a hopeful outlook, are the same benefits children receive from encountering live theatre. We are particularly thrilled that Northwestern's Office of Neighborhood and Community Relationships has partnered with the School of Communication and our neighborhood School District to make it possible for every third grader in District 65 (and their teachers) to see Me ... Jane. We hope you will have a great time at the play experiencing the delightfully curious world of a young Jane Goodall. Who knows? Maybe, like Jane, you too will be inspired to make a difference in your corner of the world. We leave you with this quote from "Dr. Jane" herself, "I do have reasons for hope: our clever brains, the resilience of nature, the indomitable human spirit, and above all, the commitment of young people when they're empowered to take action."

DRAMATURG'S NOTE

In 2014, when I was a freshman at Ewha Womans University in Seoul, South Korea, Jane Goodall gave a lecture called "Seeds of Hope." After the lecture, as a student ambassador giving tours to visitors, every time we passed the auditorium, I tried my best to spread her message. I still remember how the eyes of students shined whenever I mentioned the name Jane Goodall, and told them of her work as a naturalist who dedicated her life to studying chimpanzees.

Diving into the world of Jane, however, I realized that I've been missing one of the most important facts about her – that her achievements began in her childhood days filled with patience and passion toward the natural world. Patrick McDonnell, thankfully, noticed this and transformed the story into a theatrical piece that every generation could enjoy. For about an hour, we're part of Jane's youth: we see her avid passion for animals growing, we see Jane realizing that just having a dream isn't enough; instead, she has to do. In the end, we witness who this young girl with a limitless dream has become.

Watching Jane strive towards and later finally achieve her childhood "daydream," it's not just dreams of their own that ignite within young audiences -- it's also hope. The poetic lyrics, joyful rhythms, and utopian impulse embedded in *Me...Jane* will guide them to keep hope alive. One of my favorite quotes from Jane is, "What humans evolved from is not nearly as critical as what they're in the process of becoming." Jane becoming "a note inside that harmony" by dancing with the pack, every one of our efforts put into making this multispecies performance, and particularly, our team's awareness of the ecological footprints a single production leaves are all invaluable becomings for me. These are what make me willingly and playfully experience the "universal mystery" about which the cast sings. I truly hope this play encourages our audiences to plant "seeds of hope" in their own backyards.
